FROM REV ROB BLACKHALL - SUPERINTENDENT MINISTER

Dear Friends

As I write it is raining, again! No, it is pouring. O no, not more rain. Where is all the rain coming from and where is it going?

The news from my radio this morning was not good. Ukraine, Israel-Gaza, divisions in society, issues with health care, or lack of it. My brother spent a night in hospital – they found him a bed – in a cupboard.

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb (Mark 16:1-2)

Easter. The self-giving love, as displayed by Jesus cannot be defeated. Hatred and death will not stand against such love. There is always hope and as the first disciples were to discover as they realized that the risen Christ was among them, that there is peace.

There is great contrast between my opening paragraph and the one I have just completed.

Ukraine. The war shows no sign of ending. The death toll is horrendous. Where is it all going to end? Putin re-elected in Russia. I am writing this before the elections, but I am fairly confident in my predication!

Israel- Gaza. The 7th October Hamas attacks were the worst atrocities on the Jewish people since the Holocaust. Hamas and other want to destroy Israel and wipe Jews from the face of the earth. Hostages were taken. Israel sought to defend itself; and the carnage and destruction in Gaza have been unimaginable. Why doesn't the world do something? Well, why have we ignored the issues for decades.

Hatred in the UK is clear to see. Antisemitism is the rise. The words of politicians stoke the fires for division, deflecting away from the pains of society. A government minister applauded food banks in her constituency. Yes, they do a great job; but we should not have the need for food banks. People should not be struggling as they surely are. I hear more and more people give thanks for the work of those who work in the health service, while bemoaning a long wait to actually see anyone.

All these is about the big questions in international and political situations. God is also concerned about our lives; our hopes and fears; and loves and our loses; our dreams and visions.

Easter. Love, hope, peace.

Please don't tell me that the Good News of Jesus Christ, crucified yet risen is out of date or irrelevant. (I agree that the Church that bears his name might be).

A love for all people; that each and everyone on our planet is valued; and is given the means by which to flourish as human beings.

Peace, not just an absence of war; but a well-being for life in all its fullness.

Hope, that through the ways of God that what is current is a pale reflection of what is intended for humanity.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia! - Rob

And of course, the detail moving toward Jesus death and resurrection. Someone noted that they heard things that were very similar - that is the way the Gospels are, particularly Matthew, Mark and Luke. It was then very noticable that the style and content of John are very different. God, has richly blessed us with these four Gospels.

I am grateful to Buckland Brewer for hosting us - and that others were able to join in via You Tube, well after the initial problem of it not working!

FROM REVD ANDREW VIDAMOUR

Dear Friends,

I recently read the novel The Dean's Watch by Elizabeth Goudge, set in a cathedral city in Victorian times. Towards the very end of his life, the Dean of the Cathedral there, Adam Ayscough, enters new worlds as he meets several people, adults and children, who touch his heart in what seems to be (for him) a new way, as he tries to help and serve them in different ways (for example, he helps one young man find a more suitable apprenticeship), and generally.

This is a very moving account, and it may remind us of how God may bring about 'resurrections' in our own experience, for example in the way we look at people and the world, and as we perhaps discover new talents and avenues of service.

In his book True Resurrection, too, H.A. Williams draws our attention to the renewal we may know in our lives. For an artist, for instance, this may involve the rediscovery of creative ability after a time lacking in creative inspiration. For an athlete, it may be a recovery of form, perhaps after an injury. For any one of us, this may be the renewal of a friendship, maybe after a difference of opinion or a time of separation.

All these may not seem very spectacular, but each may follow a time of struggle (paralleling the Passion of Jesus, in a sense). Also, each renewal may offer feelings of peace, joy and satisfaction, and each may happen at any time, possibly unexpectedly, inspired by the constantly surprising Spirit of God in Christ.

I believe all these signs of hope are part of the continuing Resurrection of Jesus we celebrate at Easter and beyond for, as Martin Luther, the Protestant Reformer, put it: 'We are an Easter people'. As the angel says at the empty tomb to the friends of Jesus, 'he (Jesus) is going ahead of you to Galilee' (Mark 16: 7) (i.e. wherever you are going), and 'I am with you always, even to the end of the age' (Matthew 28: 20).

May we find, know and live God's hope afresh as we travel through the Easter season and always. Andrew Vidamour

OPTIONS FOR ADVANCED TRAINING: E:Learning - Online through the MCBX platform

A learning experience which allows the learner to move through the course at their own pace. With a facilitated Gathered Session at the end of the learning via Zoom. Booking for this option will now be through Eventbrite, where delegates will first book onto a gathered course, which will generate their registration to the e:learning site automatically. These dates will be advertised shortly.

Streamed Training Events

Designed to offer a face-to-face experience for more people across the District at once, the Advanced Module (Live-Streamed) allows leaders in your church to do this training all together, but without needing to travel as far. Teaching will be offered over a live-stream, delivered via YouTube, with space for conversations in your local context, and ways to interact with the trainers.

We will offer the Advanced Module Training as a live stream. This includes:

- All the teaching content, taught in-front of a live class, with breaks for discussion and coffee in your local venues
- A way to interact with the training team live during question and answer sessions
- A register sheet to enable your attendees to have a certificate of completion. This will be sent to them directly, or to yourself if for later distribution, via email

Host churches will offer:

- A warm, comfortable venue for 4.5hrs of training
- A chaplain for attendees
- A Circuit Safeguarding coordinator/officer for local guestions and answers
- A way to show and interact with a live-stream, suitable for the size of your group. The
 solution you use depends on the size of the group: for a 5 or below, a TV with a laptop
 plugged in may suffice. A larger group may benefit from using a projector and PA system
 connected to a computer. Regardless, a reliable internet connection will be required
 throughout the event



Exciting times are being offered to Bideford Street Pastors, but we do not have enough volunteers to take advantage of them. Recent meetings with the Town Partnership and Police have highlighted the continuing need for our presence at weekend evenings but also afternoons during the week.

Since starting in 2009, Bideford Street Pastors and School Pastors has provided a supporting presence in the town; firstly, during the evening and night-time economy (ENTE) but also at daytime events.

During nearly 15 years of caring, listening and helping we have.

- 1. been credited with enabling a reduction in anti-social behaviour of more than 50%.
- 2. engaged with hundreds of people needing support and
- 3. even be credited with physically saving several lives.

There have been a lot of faith-based conversations too; a privilege afforded to us by our Lord and the people we meet.

Street Pastors are church members who have a caring heart to take the love of Jesus into the community. People are pleased to see us when we patrol and continually thank us for being there for them. We provide the training, uniform and the tools you will need.

Our active volunteer base has shrunk due to a combination of retirement after long service, illness and promotion (to glory!).

To keep this valuable Christian outreach going we need to recruit up to 20 additional Street Pastors and several Prayer Pastors. Yes, to keep going we need you!

Lamenting and Hoping: A resurrection song for Christ and the world by Ken Howcroft.

Why, O Lord, do you seem far off?
Why are you hard to find in these times of trouble, when the world is distorted, disrupted and fragmenting around us, when abuse, isolation and broken relationships surround us, and we find ourselves awash with tears in the deserts of desolation?
How has it come to this, when people rage and politicians thunder as waves of pandemics crash down upon them, and we are all drowning in sickness, poverty and war? Save us, Lord!
The waters are up to our neck.

Where is your healing?
So when you speak words of peace and forgiveness, how can we hear them, and experience your grace, allowing it to transform us and our ways?
We have heard of new life, of new beginnings and a return to a normal reshaped from the past for the future.
We have heard the talk, but how are we to walk it?

We are out of our minds with anxiety and fear, yet suddenly and unexpectedly you come to be with us, in our meetings and homes; in our conversation on a journey; and when we are striving to go back to what we did before, trying to fish but catching nothing.

Again and again you come to us, gathering us for meals, strengthening us, comforting our confusion,

prompting us to hear your voice as we read the scriptures in heartening new ways; miraculous banquets celebrating new life in the world, foretastes in the present of our past coming to us reformed from the future: a new heaven and earth but no longer the seas of chaos; a new paradise garden now found in the city; and a new people of God now including all peoples. But as suddenly and unexpectedly as you come, you vanish.

We cannot touch you.

We cannot hold on to you.

You are gone.

Why abandon us, O Lord? Are you raising us up to forsake us again?

Or...

are you really just going ahead, and if we share in your mission, is it there we shall see you?

Remember, you say, that heavenly banquet which we shared on that night, celebrating the triumphs of God's love rooted in the Cross.

Did you see when I showed you my body that it still had the holes from the nails and the wound in my side, raised to new life?

So, Lord, are you gone from our table to be with what the world belittled, to create there your feast, sharing food with the hungry and drink with the thirsty, welcoming migrants and strangers, providing cover for those with inadequate shelter or clothing, caring for those who are sick, and visiting those locked away? Is it as we become one with you and with them that they share with us the bread of life and the wine of mercy?

Is it when tears of gladness become tears of sadness that tears of sorrow become tears of joy, suffering, dying, despairingly waiting, rising and praising commingled? Is this the pain that those who seem impaired sometimes seem able to bear and redeem?

Lord, help us become an openly broken people, open to be raised to life with you, raised with wounds still in hands and side. As you wept over Lazarus with Martha and Mary, and wept over the city, both institutions and people, may we weep with those who weep fresh tears of grace, and discover in you the grace of tears.

EXTENDING A WARM WELCOME TO COMMUNITIES 20 March 2024

Over the winter, the cost of living crisis continued to bite into stretched household budgets and Methodist Churches across the Connexion were on hand to provide a warm, welcoming space for their communities. Warm Welcome, the new name for the Warm Spaces initiative, emphasised the need to tackle isolation, as well as the cold, by building connections and community.

Over 280 Methodist Churches were registered with the Warm Welcome website for the winter. Many more simply opened their doors and events to those who were cold and in need of company.

The Methodist Church was second only to the Church of England in providing the most Warm Welcome spaces in the UK. However, measuring the scheme's impact is about far more than the numbers says Andrea Campanale, Mission Projects Officer, who takes care of the Warm Welcome initiative for the Methodist Church. "It's about local churches making a difference in their communities. Although kick-started by the cost of living crisis and the shock rise in energy prices last winter, research showed that the value of Warm Welcome spaces was in combatting loneliness and isolation.

"Neighbours who have lived close to each other for years have got to know each other at a Warm Welcome space and have grown into relationships that now provide support and company"

Many of the Warm Welcome spaces are becoming community hubs. Open all year round, one idea being considered is how Warm Welcome could provide essential respite from the heat as summer temperatures increase to dangerous levels.

The Warm Welcome Space at St Andrew's Methodist Church, Sheringham is open each Tuesday between 10am and 3pm to welcome friends from the local community. Tea, coffee, hot chocolate are offered all day and at lunchtime there is soup and a roll.

Barbara George is a church steward and one of the volunteers for the Warm Welcome at St Andrew's Methodist. "We have a table of ladies whose friendship has grown and they enjoy playing a game of cards together or a game of bingo. Two gentlemen enjoyed playing backgammon and chess together. It became obvious that as well as people having a warm safe space to meet, the need to challenge social isolation was especially important."

Those who used the space were keen to share how it made a difference to their lives. "I've enjoyed sitting and chatting; having people to listen; lovely soup and unlimited tea and coffee," said one. Another commented, "Our flat suffers from being in a very cold building. The social interaction has been equally beneficial and we have had lots of fun and laughter with the obvious health benefits that brings."




Garden of Gethsemane Word Search - Solution
